The ICOM Red Lists, a tool to Protect Cultural Objects: Discussion on the New Red List Southeast Europe!

21 August 2022, 15:45–16:45, Panorama Hall, Hybrid format

Since 2000, ICOM has been producing Red Lists to protect heritage from illicit trafficking. The entire series covers over 50 countries and Lists have been translated into over 20 languages. As tools created by museum experts to assist non-museum experts, Red Lists have a track record in identifying and protecting heritage at risk. This session will feature experts who have worked on the most recent Red List for Southeast Europe and highlight some activities for its sharing and communication.

Heritage Protection Responses in Ukraine

21 August 2022, 17:00–18:00, Panorama Hall, Hybrid format

Following the Russian invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, ICOM firstly condemned any destruction or threat to cultural heritage, called for relevant actors to support museums and museum personnel, and declared its expectation that all countries in the region abide by their obligations under the international cultural conventions. At operational level, ICOM has since worked closely with its members both inside and outside Ukraine to ascertain the needs of museums and museum professionals in Ukraine and to understand what support other museums and museum professionals elsewhere in the ICOM network can offer their Ukrainian colleagues. This panel will spotlight actions already carried out, as well as offer an opportunity to exchange on future needs for the museum community in Ukraine.

In recent times, many voices have been raised regarding the role cultural institutions should play within their own local communities. Believing that the cultural sector can remain neutral in the face of exclusion and discrimination would endanger museums' own relevance. This plenary session stimulates a wider debate on projects and ideas capable of enabling museums to take on a key role as agents of social change.

- ICOM Prague 2022 is very fisrt ICOM General conference held in hybrid format!
- In total, more than 600 lectures, roundtables, debates and other formats will take place during ICOM Prague2022 with approximately 1,000 speakers, authors, co-authors and lecturers. 19 August we have 3 509 registered participants from 123 countries 2870 onsite and 639 remotes. Exact statistics will be evaluated and published after ICOM Prague 2022 ends.
